Undocumented immigrants who are injured have rights

Our firm wins nearly \$2 million award for construction worker who was injured from a fall

Fear over deportation initially kept an undocumented immigrant, who sustained serious injuries on the job, from seeking help.

Fortunately, after consulting with our firm, Ross, Legan, Rosenberg, Zelen & Flaks LLP, a year later, the 18-year-old laborer pursued his case. Our firm ultimately won a \$1.98 million recovery for the man, who fell three stories from a scaffold and broke two vertebrae in his back, which required surgery.

We explained to our client that the Labor Law of the State of New York protects all workers, including undocumented immigrants, from height-related accidents at construction sites.

The workers' compensation law also provides that anybody injured on the job in the State of New York, whether they are legal or illegal, is entitled to have the workers' compensation carrier pay lost earnings and medical expenses that arise from the accident.

We further advised our client that lost earnings are recoverable even if the worker was paid his salary in cash and that, while the case is pending, workers' compensation will provide lost earnings to help cover living expenses.

In this particular case, the laborer's job was to take buckets of wet cement from one end of the scaffold all the way to the other end, where the masons were. Some of the wet cement spilled over onto the decking and on a subsequent trip to the masons, the worker slipped on the cement he spilled, whereupon he fell off the outer edge of an unguarded section of the scaffold.

at his deposition and claimed that the section of the scaffold where the fall occurred had guardrails. To combat the employer's false testimony, our firm subpoenaed the victim's co-employee, who also is an undocumented alien, to testify. At his videotaped deposition, the co-worker asserted that the section from which the worker fell did not have a guard railing.

Furthermore, our firm hired a civil engineer who determined that it would be impossible for the worker to have fallen off the scaffold if there had been a guard railing. As New York State Labor Law holds the owner and general contractor strictly liable to construction workers who fall from a height due to inadequate safety devices, the defendants were determined by the court to owe the plaintiff all damages without any reduction for the worker's own negligence in causing the accident.

After establishing liability, to prove damages, our firm hired a vocational expert who determined that the plaintiff was permanently disabled from work. We also retained an economist who evaluated the total amount of past and future lost earnings, including inflation.


Presently, our client still resides in Brooklyn and has completed physical therapy. He now is able to engage in regular everyday activities with some pain. He has bending and lifting limitations and can no longer carry heavy items.

After obtaining a judgment on liability, the case was resolved just before trial. As part of the settlement, the workers' compensation carrier agreed to waive its lien on the money it had expended for past lost earning and medical expenses. The monetary recovery amply compensated the worker for his pain and suffering and provided the injured worker with long-term financial security.

No matter your immigration status, if you are injured in a fall or other accident while on the job, you may be entitled to recover damages.

Some of these suits include enabling a 28-year-old woman to obtain a \$750,000 settlement after she lost her uterus while giving birth. She was under the care of a midwife, who pulled too hard on the umbilical cord that was still attached to the uterus.

Another recent case involved a 41-year-old man who was riding a bicycle and was struck and killed by a garbage truck. His family received a \$500,000 settlement.

Two other accidental death cases also involved undocumented immigrants. Our firm represented a 46-year-old man who died after the cherry-picker truck he was working in was hit by another truck, causing the man to fall off the crane. His family obtained \$340,000.

Our firm also secured a \$475,000 settlement for the family of a 34-year-old man killed after he climbed a ladder to work on a rooftop and was electrocuted by a live conduit.

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RLRZF successfully helped seriously injured clients in 2011

In 2011, our law firm recovered large settlements for many seriously injured clients. Below are some cases our firm successfully handled and the dollar amounts awarded:

Work-related accidents

- \$1,980,000 for an undocumented laborer who fell off an unguarded scaffold, resulting in a fractured back and surgery.
- \$475,000 for the family of an undocumented laborer electrocuted at a job site.
- \$340,000 for a 46-year-old undocumented laborer who was knocked off a scaffold when the scaffold was struck by a car.
- \$320,000 for a middle-aged laborer who fell through an unclipped grating at a construction site, resulting in a torn rotator cuff and deranged hip.
- \$265,000 for an air-conditioning installer who fractured his ankle and needed surgery when he tripped over uneven planks at a job site.

Auto accidents

• \$1,500,000 for a 45-year-old female

pedestrian, who experienced multiple fractures and skin grafts, after being struck by a minibus.

- \$500,000 for the family of a bicycle delivery man killed by a garbage truck.
- \$375,000 for a delivery man on a motorcycle who was hit by a cab, fracturing his hip. This included the \$100,000 insurance limit and \$275,000 paid by the taxi owner out of pocket.
- \$275,000 for a middle-aged pedestrian struck by a truck backing up at a storage facility, fracturing her pelvis.
- \$125,000 for an intoxicated bicyclist going the wrong way on a one-way street and hit by a truck.

Medical malpractice

- \$750,000 for an undocumented woman whose uterus was pulled out of the birth canal along with the placenta when the hospital midwife pulled too hard on the umbilical cord during delivery.
- \$350,000 for a 32-year-old woman who was improperly administered anesthesia be-

fore her C-section, causing her to slip into a three-week coma.

- \$250,000 for a mother whose child's shoulder got stuck in the birth canal during delivery. The child suffered nerve damage to the arm during delivery.
- \$125,000 for a 13-year-old whose appendicitis was not diagnosed at the hospital, resulting in a ruptured appendix and surgery.

Premises liability

- \$237,500 for a New Jersey woman who injured her back jumping out the window of an illegal boardinghouse that caught fire.
- \$225,000 for a pedestrian who tripped on a broken curb and fractured her ankle.
- \$175,000 for a 73-year-old supermarket shopper who was knocked over by a store employee pushing a cart, fracturing her L3 vertebrae and requiring kyphoplasty.
- \$122,500 for an elderly woman who slipped on a ramp in a supermarket and fractured her knee. We proved the ramp was "optically confusing."
